



Morality, Ethics and Law

Ethics Law

- Moral philosophy guiding human conduct
- Right versus wrong
- Good behavior
- May be abstract
- Individual and professional guidelines
- Violations not usually punished



- Based on ethics
- Codification of certain ethical values
- Government administered
- Written in laws and regulations
- Punishable with fines or imprisonment
- Intent is to maintain peace and order in society

- Emotional or mental handicaps






Vulnerability in developing countries

 Any interaction where the language of the client and the health professional differ and where the potential for literacy, education and other barriers to clear communication exist







Dependent upon a person's situation-specific ability to make consent related decisions (Eyler and Jeste, 2006)

Consequences

Does the client/recipient:

- Understand the situation and the procedure
- Appreciate the consequences of consent
- Appreciate the consequences of refusal
